# **My Franconia Ancestors**

This is the story of my ancestors from the pioneer families of **Souder, Benner, Hunsberger, Fillman, Meyers** and **Fluck** of Franconia Twp, Montgomery and Bucks County, Pennsylvania. My research over 40-plus years has uncovered some genealogies of our ancestors going back 15 generations to the **Rosenbergers** around **1616**. I have added my own research to this story along with photos that I took on my pilgrimage to back to Bucks County, PA (where I lived for most of my life) in 2004. The addition of photos generously provided by Fox family members was such an unexpected bonus.

### Katie Ellen Fluck and Edwin H Meyers

My search for my Great Grandmother, Katie Ellen Fluck has been a passion of mine for over 40 years (as I my family will tell you). I am compelled to tell the stories of our ancestors in order to inspire younger family members and inform them of their very rich heritage. My hope is that they enjoy the process of learning about themselves through the histories of their parents, grandparents, and the generations that came before them. So, in order to make sure that no individual story gets lost I made finding my Great Grandmother, Katie Ellen my "mission".

I tried hard to piece together the smallest clues from the memories of my aunts Anne and Ruth to find out about the life of Katie and her husband Edwin Meyers. I have kept every scrap of notes from interviews with my family as far back as 1979! In July 2011 my 2<sup>nd</sup> (once removed) cousin Claire, a descendant of my grandmother's sister, Naomi Meyers, contacted me via email. Through Claire, a few more nuggets of information has lead me to *much* more of Katie's story. And to my delight, after speaking with Claire's grandmother, Virginia Fox (Sis), I was able to piece together much more of Katie Ellen's story.

The amazing photo below was generously provided by Virginia Fox Weatherlow in July 2011. There are no words to explain how touched I am to finally look at the face of the woman I spent so many years trying to find. When I look at this photo I can see such a strong resemblance to our contemporary family. The little girl sitting in the front row could easily be me!



Virginia Fox writes: "My mother [Naomi Louise Meyers Fox] is the smallest child on the floor in the middle of the front row. Miriam [her sister] is the girl standing behind her with her arm on the old lady. The couple all the way on the left are Edwin Meyers and Katie Fluck Meyers".

In 1880 Katie was three years old and living with her grandparents, **Abraham O Souder** and **Leah Fillman Souder**. She "disappeared" until the 1900 census when she was married to Edwin H. Meyers and had two children, **Naomi** and **Miriam** (my Grandmother). By 1910 she was 33 and a widow with two teenage daughters. The girls had to leave school at an early age to help support the family. Naomi became a telephone operator and Miriam worked as a waitress in Quakertown, PA, where they were living at the time.

# A Short History


Souderton, PA (Montgomery and Bucks Counties)

The original inhabitants of the **Souderton-Telford** region were the Lenni-Lenape, also called the Delaware Indians. They were among the first to come in contact with Europeans in the early 1600s. Pokasie, today Perkasie, is believed to be the Lenape village nearest to Souderton.

Montgomery and Bucks Counties, where Souderton and Telford are located, originated out of the land granted to William Penn, which he purchased from the Lenape, who, due to the massive amounts of immigrants who began to pour in, were eventually forced to head west.

**Souderton** was first settled by immigrant Welsh, giving Souderton the early name of Welshtown. These were followed by German Mennonites beginning around 1719, and by 1750 they would occupy most of the land. The town is named for one of its pioneer settlers, Henry O. Souder.

Souderton was almost entirely developed for agricultural purposes, and was known as a small farm service oriented community. The railroad enabled Souderton to grow not only in industry but also as a community. The textile and cigar making industries brought prosperity and population to the borough. Some of the big **cigar manufactures** at this time had factories in Souderton. However by 1920, automation in the cigar industry reduced the need for labor and space and the industry started to decline in



Souderton. The **textile mills** remained prominent in Souderton after the decline of the cigar industry. In the years following World War II, the need for expensive labor in the textile industry was eliminated. My great grandmother, Katie, worked in the textile industry and members of the Souder family worked in the cigar manufactory.

Franconia Township was originally a part of Salford Township, which was established about 1727. However, in 1731, Franconia, which included areas now occupied by **Souderton** and the Montgomery County portion of **Telford**, separated from the original Salford Township. The major reason for the split was that the township had grown too populous for one constable to serve.

The name Franconia signifies "the land of the Franks" and is a name derived from an old German Duchy. On a map prepared in 1682, Franconia is called "The Dutch Township," inferring a predominance of German settlers. Descendants of these original settlers are still found today in large numbers in Franconia and the boroughs of Souderton and Telford, which were a part of Franconia until the 1880's and 1890's.

The first settlers found the valley of the Indian Creek under Indian cultivation and consequently named the stream after them. The Indian Creek valley was perhaps more thickly settled with Indians than any other place in Montgomery County, attested by the vast amount and variety of relics found within the valley. In addition, the northern section of the township was known as "Indianfield," even as late as 1809.

# Little Zion Lutheran Church [1730]

**Religious freedom** was a major reason for the emigration of people from Europe. The earliest church on record in Franconia was a log church known as **Indianfield Lutheran (Little Zion) Church**. The log structure was built in 1730. In 1734 there were thirty-four taxables and landholders in Franconia, nearly all German. At that time, there were not more than 175 inhabitants, two grist mills, one tannery. The name "Little Zion" began to be used by the Indianfield congregation in 1875. In 1893, the church was incorporated with its official name as "The Little Zion's Evangelical Lutheran Church of Franconia Township, Montgomery County, Pennsylvania". Little Zion is a name that no other Lutheran congregation shares.

In 1881-1882, the church underwent major renovation. The east gable was extended; the balconies were changed to include the east, north and south walls and the pulpit was moved from the north wall to the west gable. The bell tower and steeple also were added.

"... After much debate, some quite heated, the vote of the congregation was to remove [the Sexton's House]. This was done in 1955. The earliest known sexton, and occupant of the sexton's house, was **Abram Souder**. The date cannot be definitely established – probably in the 1860's and 1870's." *Source: Moyer, Clayton C., 1970* 

A large number of the earlier settlers were Mennonite. The Franconia Mennonite Meetinghouse was founded between 1730 and 1750, and is one of the largest Mennonite churches in Pennsylvania. Other churches included the Indian Creek Reformed Church (Christ Church), built of logs in the 1750's. Its founders were immediate descendents of French Huguenots, Hollanders and Palatines. Leidy's Church, built in 1858, had a schoolhouse and graveyard on that site over one hundred years earlier. The schoolhouse was used for public worship until the church was built.

# **My Souder Ancestors**

Records of my Souder ancestors begin with Jacob Sowder and Anna Rosenberger. They are my 8<sup>th</sup> Great Grandparents. Our oldest known ancestors are Jakob Rosenberger (1616- 1681) and Verna Pletcher (-1657). The numbers after the names indicate our direct line of ancestors.



# **Christian Souder**<sup>3</sup>

He and his wife, **Mary Oberholtzer**, are believed to be buried at Franconia Meeting-house, but there are no marked graves. She was a daughter of Jacob and Deborah Maldemen Oberholtzer. They lived on the Erwin J. Moyer farm on East Chestnut St., Souderton. He served in the Revolutionary War-enrolled in 3rd class, 4th company, 5th battalion, Phila. County militia, under Capt. John Cope, from Franconia Township. They had 5 children.



# **Meyers-Fluck Ancestors**

Christian Meyer and his family from near Zurich Switzerland were being persecuted because of their Mennonite faith. They and many other Mennonites suffered at the hands of the government controlled by the Catholic church in the principality of Switzerland until they emigrated to the Rhine Valley in what is now Germany and eventually to the British Colonies in their search for religious freedom, peace and hope for a better life.

Other Mennonites with family names like **Souder**, Landes, Derstein, Rosenberger, Alderfer, Bergey and Moyer (Meyers) also left Switzerland in about 1640 as they had suffered enough as well. (Mennonites with names like Tyson, Godshall and Lucken left Holland around the same time.) All these Mennonite families traveled to the Palatinate area from Germany along the Rhine River.

Beginning in 1683 through an invitation of William Penn they began migrating to Pennsylvania. Some Meyer families came later in 1727 during the time when a large number of Mennonites and Lutherans from Germany were leaving for the new world in their quest for a better life. The word had spread, Pennsylvania was the place to move to.

Edwin H. Meyers came from this hearty stock of pioneers, who traveled thousands of miles to settle in Franconia, Pennsylvania and begin farming the land and building new lives.



# The Souder and Fluck Connection

Katie Fluck's mother died before she was 3 years old and in 1880 Census Katie was living with her grandparents Abraham and Leah Souder. Just this morning (July 19, 2011) I connected an old photo I took of a grave in 2004 to Katie's story and discovered that Katie's mother was Emma Catherine "Katie" Fluck who died in 1879 (see photo of grave below) and is buried at Little Zion Church near her parents.

Emma Catherine was the daughter of Abraham and Leah Souder (see 1860 Census for Souder), and Katie Ellen was their granddaughter. So all of this evidence pointed to Emma Catherine as Katie's mother. When Emma Catherine died in 1879 Katie would have been only 2 or 3 years old and then was forced to move in with her grandparents, which is proven by the 1880 census. I took a photo of Emma Catherine's grave in 2004 at the time feeling positive that there *must* be a connection and now, seven years later, that connection has "clicked". (*I just live for moments like this!*)

On July 3 1880 **Jacob H. Fluck** re-married, this time to **Ellamanda Souder Saylor** [b. abt 1847], age about 33 years old, both of Richlandtown, by the Rev. H. F. Seiple. Ellamanda was **Emma Catherine Souder's sister**. *Source:* <u>http://www.larryhillpot.com/intell\_marriages.htm</u>

I found a family in the 1860 Census that might be a match for Jacob's parents but have not verified it with any other sources, but I mention it here (below) as a possibility. This Jacob would have been born about 1850, which fits in the time frame of his marriage to his first wife who was born in 1855.

# Katie Ellen Fluck and Edwin H. Meyers

Katie was only 16 years old when she married 19-year-old Edwin H Meyers of Bedminster. Their life together must have been very difficult because Edwin died in 1907 at the young age of 33 and Katie was about 30. In the 1900 census Edwin was listed as 26 years old with no occupation, which is very rare. Family lore is that Edwin was injured when he was working in a stove factory. Apparently he was hit on the side of the head with a stove pipe, which led to his blindness, which meant he probably could not work in 1900. Since the incident happened at a young age, it meant that Katie bore the job of supporting the family (apparently for most of her life). I am going to try to get his death certificate for verification, but it is possible he died from complications of that accident although heart failure is the leading cause of death in males at a young age in our family.

Their daughters Naomi and Miriam were only 13 and 11 years old when Edwin died.

The daughters of **Naomi (Anne)** and **Miriam (Virginia)**, remember that Katie lived out in the country in New Jersey and kept goats and chickens and sold milk and eggs to support the family financially. She kept a vegetable garden and canned fruit and vegetables and Virginia (Sis) remembers her grandmother's cellar full of canned goods. I still need to confirm this, but it's also possible that she raised **bulldogs** – Anne thinks she raised the dogs for sale.

Miriam and Naomi were unfortunately forced to quit school early to help support the family. At ages 17 and 15 they were working as a telephone operator and waitress in Quakertown, PA.

Anne and Virginia also remember riding out the PRC (Philadelphia's public transportation) to visit with Katie – she was a cashier for the PRC and they visited with her during her work hours. (see 1930 census for occupation below)

Before 1920, Katie remarried to Edwin Parker and was living in Philadelphia, and by 1930 they were living in Runnemede, New Jersey. Katie was living in Woodbury, NJ about 1945, where she died at age 70.

The family of Naomi Meyers Fox has a famous family photo of Katie with a goat on her back. As soon as I locate that photo I'll be sure to add it to this story!

# The Philadelphia Home for Incurables

4700 WOODLAND AVENUE (DAUBY ROAD)

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND:

"The object is to provide a home for that class of sufferers whose diseases are pronounced incurable.

The members of the corporation are such persons as contribute to the support of the Home one dollar or more annually. Life members may be constituted by the payment of twenty-five dollars, and honorary members by the payment of fifty dollars.

Application for admission may be made to any member of the Admission Committee. Applicants must have been either dismissed from a hospital as incurable, or so pronounced by the attending physician, and in all cases must submit to the examination of a visiting physician of the Home.

Patients are provided for gratuitously, their support becoming a charge upon the resources of the Home. An admission fee of \$100 is required, except in extreme cases, where the terms are arranged by the Admission Committee, subject to the action of the Board of Managers. If any inmate, by becoming curable, or for any other good reason, be deemed an unsuitable case for retention in the Home, such inmate may be discharged".





# History of Moyer / Moyers / Mayer / Meyer / Meyers / Myers

Though the family name Moyer probably originated in Switzerland, not all of the various Swiss immigrants to colonial America who bore the Name Meyer were related to each other. The Moyer Family Genealogy of 1896, a huge volume of over 700 pages, includes many immigrants, some of whom were Mennonites, others not.

Among the Mennonite Moyer family immigrants that may be mentioned is Christian Meyer (d. ca. 1751) of Switzerland, who was in Pennsylvania by 1719, settling on the Indian Creek in Lower Salford Twp., Montgomery Co. One of his sons, Christian Meyer, (ca. 1705-87) was a deacon in the Franconia district of the Mennonite Church Franconia Conference. Another son, Jacob Meyer (1730-78), was a preacher at Perkasie. Immigrant Hans Meyer (d. ca. 1748) came to Pennsylvania around 1720 and located in what is now Upper Salford Twp., Montgomery Co. (then Skippack Twp., Philadelphia Co.) A third Mennonite Meyer immigrant was preacher Peter Meyer, born in Switzerland ca. 1723, who immigrated to America ca. 1741 with his mother, three brothers, and a sister. He located in Springfield Township, Bucks Co. In 1773 he was ordained preacher in the Swamp district of the Franconia Conference. His brother Jacob Meyer (1721-1790) settled in Saucon Township, now Lehigh County. He was ordained a preacher in the Swamp district in 1752 and bishop in 1763. Jacob's son Samuel Meyer (d. 1832) was also a preacher at Saucon.

# Descendants of Jacob Moyer/ Meyers and Mary Detweiler

These are our oldest-known Meyers ancestors. William [1789-1837] had 13 siblings so we can assume that we have many Meyers cousins still living in Upper Bucks and Montgomery Counties. I hope to continue my research on those families to discover more information on our Meyers family.

He inherited from his grandfather, Christian Meyer, Sr., the homestead farm of 100 acres, the greater part of which is now owned and occupied by Joseph Drissel. To this property he added by subsequent purchases until he owned in all 232 acres. On Oct. 9, 1765, he purchased of David Stribe and wife 50 acres and 66 perches, which is now owned by Henry Oberholtzer. He next purchased on May 27, 1767, from the widow of his uncle Samuel Meyer, the 50 acres originally belonging to the homestead, with buildings and improvements, where William K.
